The launch is also structured around various events, video-screenings, residencies, radio, conversations with theorists, artists and researchers.

Taking into account the artistic production of the new millennium in three countries, Atlantica reflects different histories and artistic visions, along with a wide variety of formats and genres of writing, also reflecting the diversity of origins of its authors. Contemporary art practices that have emerged and developed countries are in themselves tools of resistance and rebellion. As such, central to the decolonization goals that artists used to understand, analyze and resist the socioeconomic impact of everyday events and their own personal realities. After colonization ended in its official form, we were left with its radioactive decay. This non-linear and stochastic purification reappears as a constant euphemistic hope: "Africa Rising". The conventional media, cynically, is

constantly celebrating Africa's never-ending Emergence. What they do not fully articulate is their specific idea of emergence, which can be reimagined as a form of homogenization. So, "Soon they will start talking and acting like us." But when Africa and its peoples in the diaspora take the position of actually shaping and governing their destiny? The constant collapse and failures of colonial 'isms' - be it Capitalism, Socialism, Communism, Neo-liberalism, Federalism - are all too familiar, but from where we emerge we emerge to find guidance for a new cultural and economic movement that is suited and shaped by Africans? There is a lot of talk nowadays about the decolonization of thought, principles, structure, structures and institutions, but how to decolonize contagion?
